4 MAYOR MCGINTY: Madam Clerk the roll,  
5 please.

6 MS. CONROY: Trustee Michael  
7 Gagliardi.

8 TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: Present.

9 MS. CONROY: Barbara Volpe-Reid.

10 MAYOR MCGINTY: Excused.

11 MS. CONROY: Irene Naudus.

15 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Present.

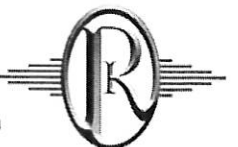
16 MS. CONROY: Village Attorney Susan

24 TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: Nassau County for  
25 the month of August. Two arrests, forty

3 MAYOR McGINTY: The aided cases, is  
4 that the police department doing the aided? Do  
5 we hear them on the phones like the fire  
6 department?

7 TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: If it's a dual  
8 response, 911 not available, call the fire  
9 department or vice-versa. We have a total for  
10 the month of forty-four. They work together  
11 like thirty-nine times, per se.

12 MAYOR McGINTY: Thank you.

13 TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: For the fire  
14 department. Month of September we have  
15 seventy-seven alarms. Signal nines, forty-four.  
16 Second signal nines six. Ten aided members.  
17 Five general alarms. Six still eights. And  
18 five water rescues and one silent alarm  
19 seventy-seven for the month of September from  
20 the fire department.

21 MAYOR McGINTY: Thank you. Do you  
22 want to handle Beach and Recreation?

23 TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: Good evening,  
24 everyone. First I would like it thank everybody  
25 for the great summer season 2018. Thanks to all

5                   For the month of August to date I have  
6 some thirty-three expired meters. Twenty-three  
7 backed into stall. One handicapped. No  
8 commercial parking two. No parking permit, six.  
9 Left to curb, one. Blocked driveway, one.  
10 Blocked fire hydrant, one. Alternate street  
11 parking, ninety. Parking in the road, one.  
12 Inspection, six. Restricted parking,  
13 twenty-seven. Other, nine. Expired regular  
14 sixty, two. Out of stall, seventeen. Two in a  
15 bus stop. Non-distinctive plates, one. Parking  
16 on sidewalk, three. Twelve inches within the  
17 curb, two. Inspections, twenty-five. And  
18 expired reg, sixteen. Which is grand total of  
19 three hundred nine violations handed out for the  
20 month.

21                   MAYOR McGINTY: Are there any other  
22 reports?

23                   TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: That's it. Before  
24 I close my report, October, the whole month of  
25 October is Fire Prevention Month. The Island

3   house October 9th. We have done it in the past.  
4   October 9th, nine a.m. to one p.m. There are  
5   all sorts of exhibits. If anybody wishes to

7   handing out different detectors, like the C.O.  
8   detector. We will be handing out literature for  
9   the fire sprinkler for residential homes.

10                   MAYOR MCGINTY: Deputy Mayor just  
11   Trustee Annarella, Planning and Zoning.

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2 I'll go into my Public Works report. The  
3 following was collected in August: Two hundred  
4 seventy point eighty-seven tons municipal waste.  
5 Thirteen point sixty-five tones of mixed glass.  
6 Twenty-seven point twenty-eight tons of  
7 municipal agriculture.

8 All streetlights and meters reported  
9 not working were being repaired. All Village  
10 owned property is being maintained. All the  
11 flags were on on half staff on Veterans Day for  
12 a little respect for our veterans and the plows  
13 and sanders are getting ready in the garage to  
14 be ready or the season. That is my report,  
15 Mayor.

16 MAYOR MCGINTY: Madam Clerk, in all  
17 our discussions I keep forgetting, would you  
18 have the staff prepare a schedule of storm  
19 building permits issued, storm building building  
20 permits completed, storm building permits  
21 outstanding. Storm building permits, that is  
22 the fourth time, storm building permits sent on  
23 the revenue side to FEMA and any collections  
24 therein, please, because I think that is  
25 seventy-five and one fifty. Would you ask?





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2 MS. CONROY: I'll have to confirm the  
3 numbers.

4 MAYOR McGINTY: That sounds like a  
5 good job for Sebastian to interact with the  
6 Building Department to keep him out of trouble.

7 MS. CONROY: Yes, Mayor.

8 MAYOR McGINTY: This is the first  
9 month that we haven't had a solar job. For the  
10 record, we are averaging between one and a half  
11 and two solar jobs a month.

12 How are you, Sergeant? I would like  
13 to susspend the normal business. Sergeant,  
14 would you give us your report, please.

15 SERGEANT KILFOIL: For the month of  
16 August, 2018 We had two arrests, one on August  
17 3rd and one on August 11th, both for criminal  
18 possession of a controlled substance, some sort  
19 of narcotic. Forty parking tickets, six moving  
20 violations. EMS had thirty-nine aided cases a  
21 lot of aid cases people not feeling well. No  
22 burglaries, no robberies.

23 MAYOR McGINTY: I'll repeat what I say  
24 each month. Five years ago, the 4th Precinct  
25 had one sector car during the week and one

2   sector car on the weekend. Since then, in  
3   fullness of time during any given day any given  
4   shift you're going to find two sector cars  
5   somewhere in the Village. On the weekend you  
6   will find three sector cars and usually it's the  
7   SUV.

8           SERGEANT KILFOIL: Most of the cars  
9   are mostly SUV now.

10          MAYOR MCGINTY: The response time over  
11   the years in, as in a more difficult economic  
12   time for the police department where there have  
13   been more retirements and less hiring, their  
14   response time is lower today than it was five  
15   years ago.

16          Most recently, we had an incident on  
17   56 Suffolk Road, where not only did our cars  
18   respond, there was an arrest for controlled  
19   substance and the fellow arrested had  
20   outstanding warrants for one or two robberies.  
21   They let one person go, with the wrath of God,  
22   no doubt, and the second person they're trying  
23   to find. But now I know because I was out --  
24   michael, you were with me, Trustee Gagliardi and  
25   I will were out there in the night and again in

2 the morning and there was no point during the  
3 night or no point in the morning that there  
4 wasn't a car in the environment for 56 Suffolk  
5 Road.

6           For the record, you may say to  
7 yourself what is so big about 56 Suffolk Road.  
8 In the neighborhood there are three widows and  
9 one -- all four in their eighties and one lady,  
10 it's her and her husband in their eighties.  
11 When you had something like 56 Suffolk Road  
12 occurring for the police to respond, and respond  
13 so strongly, it's deeply gratifying and it just  
14 continues. The utter faith I have both  
15 professionally and personally in Nassau County's  
16 finest.

17           SERGEANT KILFOIL: I appreciate the  
18 words.

19           MAYOR McGINTY: In the last five  
20 years, in the Greekfest and Finfest there were  
21 no incidents. Everything was peaceful and calm.  
22 There was a positive police presence. And  
23 frankly, Sergeant Solomon was on his own time  
24 possibly that night. So this is a very  
25 dedicated group of men and women. We should

2    take our hats off to them. I just want that in  
3    the record.

4           SERGEANT KILFOIL: Thank you. Do you  
5    guys have any questions?

6           MAYOR McGINTY: That's it.

7           SERGEANT KILFOIL: I'll be on my way.

8           MAYOR McGINTY: While I'm thinking  
9    about it L'shana tova, where it's appropriate.

10          MAYOR McGINTY: My own report, on the  
11    HMGP report the forty million dollar drainage  
12    project. We received an informal approval for  
13    Phase 2 design and engineering services. We are  
14    waiting for the official signature, session, if  
15    you will.

16          We are meeting with Congresswoman  
17    Rice's staff on a regular basis. As a matter of  
18    fact, I'm meeting with them tomorrow morning.  
19    We are seeking assistance for federal grant  
20    funds for future upgrading and cleaning of the  
21    drains. As the drains go in you can't just walk  
22    away. We will be maintaining them and cleaning  
23    the tidal flex valves. We believe Tom Curry, of  
24    Congresswoman Rice's office, believes funds are  
25    available under the Clean Water Act.



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2 As the drainage continues, gentlemen,  
3 I'm sure, I don't remember if I mentioned this,  
4 but I'll mention it now, I met with the Nassau  
5 County DPW. Originally Deputy Commissioner  
6 Brian Schneider, who is now a deputy county  
7 executive. He documented environmental bond  
8 funds available to the Village for swirl  
9 separators in the storm drains going forward.  
10 For the record, those swirl separators do not  
11 represent a duplication of benefits. Separate  
12 and distinct. That is a key for us all the  
13 time.

14 We have had the fuel tanks at the far  
15 end removed. No contamination to the soil,  
16 thank goodness. We are going to open bids soon  
17 for the replacement tanks.

18 I was going to talk about the passive  
19 park. That is all part of the transit  
20 development on Long Beach Road. We had the  
21 opportunity to compete for funds for  
22 Assemblywoman Miller's office. We received two.  
23 The first, fifty thousand and the second,  
24 twenty-five thousand dollars. Those funds will  
25 be utilized for the geographical area north of

2   Sagamore Road with two exceptions, I'll come to  
3   that in a second.

4                   We are going to be putting crosswalks  
5   and New York State D.O.T., D.M.V. approved  
6   signage to slow traffic, calm traffic down along  
7   Long Beach Road. We will also have a crosswalk  
8   on this end in front of the Island Park Jewish  
9   Center. So you will have it periodically with  
10   the appropriate signage. Frankly, the crosswalk  
11   will serve both the library and specifically the  
12   Jewish Center because you have the Jewish  
13   Center, the Baptist Church and library, so we  
14   are trying to make things a little safer on Long  
15   Beach Road.

16                  Preliminary, on the emergency  
17   operations management center on the second floor  
18   of the Island Park Fire Department. We met the  
19   other day with the consultant. We are doing  
20   some preliminary design. We had Chief Briguglio  
21   I know you were busy so we will have plans for  
22   you to see where we are on that project. That  
23   is moving ahead, albeit slowly. It does  
24   include, Chief Briguglio, the elevator and the  
25   fifth bay on the north end. If you take note --



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2 I'm bugging Chief Briguglio tonight -- take  
3 note, we reclaimed that easement from Verizon.

4 But, we continue working with our  
5 shared services agreement with Nassau County.  
6 We will meet with them again soon to iron out  
7 odds and ends. For example, we had a sinkhole  
8 at the northeast side of Long Beach Road in the  
9 general vicinity of Kildare Road. Nassau County  
10 DPW came down. Not only did they repair, but  
11 they showed our men how they repaired the  
12 sinkhole problem that is popping up throughout  
13 the county, particularly on the South Shore.

14 We had a second IMA with the Town of  
15 Hempstead for fuel depot services. Roland, what  
16 happened, we take out the tanks. I don't want  
17 to go to the neighborhood gas station, so we use  
18 the depot services of the Town of Hempstead and  
19 they bill us accordingly.

20 MR. ZIMATORE: Can you continue using  
21 it all along instead of spending money and  
22 putting the new tanks in?

23 MAYOR MCGINTY: No, because over time  
24 the labor costs become intrusive, plus I believe  
25 if we have an emergency, we should have our own.



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2 If you have every incorporated area going to a  
3 fuel depot we will be low on the totem pole. So  
4 we should have our own, with, by the way, a  
5 generator in case the electric ever goes out on  
6 these tanks.

7 We are also in the middle of grant  
8 opportunity in conjunction with the Town of  
9 Hempstead having to do with water quality  
10 efforts, and we may end up using a -- sharing a  
11 vacuum truck for cleaning out drain boxes with  
12 the Town of Hempstead. We are working on that  
13 as we speak.

14 We are continuing erosion preventative  
15 efforts at Little Beach. There will be a  
16 volunteer fall clean-up soon. We are trying to  
17 get the dates here because you have the fire  
18 department, Splash, the Surf Riders.

19 MR. ZIMATORE: I have been going out  
20 every two weeks picking up stuff on the beach  
21 and I see people at the other end of the beach  
22 picking stuff up.

23 MAYOR MCGINTY: There is a great deal  
24 of pride. We will meet with the DEC shortly to  
25 discuss a number of issues including the DEC

2    permit we need for the erosion projects down at  
3    the end of Beach Way south of Masone Beach,  
4    which impacts Masone Beach. Once that project  
5    is completed, that will be the installation of  
6    gabions and reclaiming of ground.

7                   Madam Clerk, I don't know if I  
8    mentioned this to you. I spoke with PSEG this  
9    morning and the upgraded transmission lines will  
10   commence in October. We serve as pilot projects  
11   for PSEG as they move forward. We find that  
12   that everything they have done here has had a  
13   positive impact on us, including, by the way, as  
14   we are installing LED lights we need to submit a  
15   schedule of the geographical placement,  
16   preferably GIS information for where those  
17   lights have been installed because there is a  
18   different rate, electrical rate on municipal LED  
19   than there is on municipal regular wattage  
20   lights. Not only do we achieve a savings  
21   because the LED lights are longer lasting, but  
22   our electric rate goes down.

23                  I think that is all I have for  
24    tonight. Thank you. Madam Clerk, the roll, if  
25    you will.



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2 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the  
3 abstract for audited vouchers for the month of  
4 September, 2018 be approved for payment.

5 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: I'll make it.

6 TRUSTEE GAGLIARDI: Second.
