21	add section 217(p) which allows a sponsor of a
22	LOSAP to award up to five points a month during
23	the quarantine period, with a prorated amount
24	awarded for a partial month; and,
25	Whereas, the Fire Department has

- I would like to take this opportunity
- 14 to provide an update of activity here in the
- 15 Village of Island Park.
- 16 The Hazardous Mitigation Grant Program
- 17 is moving forward. We are approximately
- 18 forty-five days ahead of schedule. We are also
- 19 under budget. The design and engineering phase
- 20 is one hundred percent complete and under the
- 21 review of the FEMA consortium.
- 22 The Village will be seeking bids in
- 23 mid-spring for construction. The initial phase
- 24 of construction for the HMPG program will
- 25 encompass Suffolk Road from Island Parkway

2	southerly to Deal Road. Construction includes
3	the geographic area contiguous to the Heagarty
4	Elementary School, including Warwick Road, Deal
5	Road, Radcliffe Road, Hastings Road. It
6	includes the installation of tidal flex valves
7	along the Island Park canal. To date, the
8	Village, under a pilot project and the
9	supervision, guidance and efforts of Cameron
10	Engineering has installed two tidal flex valves
11	of differing designs at Beach Way and the
12	intersection of Warwick and Suffolk Roads. Both
13	are showing successful outcomes.
14	The installation of fuel tanks at the
15	Department of Public Works locale has been
16	accomplished in conjunction with the upgrade and
17	installation of fuel dispensers, diesel and
18	regular fuel.
19	The construction of the firefighters'
20	training center has been completed and included
21	the purchase of "bail-out" gear for our first
22	responders, our firefighters.
23	The resiliency and hardening project
24	for the Village of Island Park Emergency
25	Management Center is underways The Emergence

2	Management Center is located on the second floor
3	of the Island Park firehouse. Construction
4	contract documents have been signed by the
5	Village and reviewed by the New York State
6	Office of Emergency Management. The projects
7	includes dry floodproofing along the perimeter
8	of the firehouse.
9	The beach stabilization and erosion
10	control project has been completed. This
11	project is located to the south of Masone Beach
12	at the foot of Beach Way and in conjunction with
13	approximately five hundred tons of sand will
14	insure protection of residences and the beach
15	from storm induced erosion.
16	The Village has entered into a
17	contract with Northwell Health Group for
18	ambulance services covering the Village of
19	Island Park, Barnum Isle and Harbor Isle. This
20	contract to assist the rescue company of the
21	Island Park Fire Department and includes the
22	participation of the Nassau County Police
23	Department. The purpose of increased ambulance
24	services will serve to insure the public health
25	and public safety of the Island Park Fire

2	Department catchment area.
3	At present the design and engineering
4	phase of the Transit-Oriented Development grant
5	for upgrades along the business district of
6	Island Park has been completed. Documents are
7	being prepared by the Nelson Pope Consulting
8	Group for construction on Long Beach Road from
